The Passing of Civil War "Vet"

James Kemp Johnson of Ursina, son of the late John and Sarah Kemp Johnson, of Mill Run, Fayette County, Pa., one of the three remaining Civil War veterans in Somerset County, died July 6th. He would have reached 90 years of age had he lived until Aug. 20th. He had been in failing health since March 1st, but was bedfast only one and one-half days. He took to his bed on Tuesday and died at 12:25 P.M on Wednesday, July 6. Mr. Johnson was a private in Company B, 57th Pennsylvania Infantry, and was federal pensioner. He was born Aug. 20. 1848, near Mill Run. He enlisted in Army on Aug. 24, 1864, at the age of 16, but gave his age as 18. Therefore, his pension age would make him two years older, 60. He served nine months, until May 31, 1863, when he was honorably discharged. On his way home from the army his knapsack was stolen, and his papers and keepsakes were all lost. In 1867 he married Miss Kathryn Wilson. To this union 16 children were born- 10 sons and 6 daughters- 5 sons and 5 daughters died in infancy; 5 sons and one daughter lived to maturity and preceded him to the grave. His wife died in 1911. Three sons survive--Thomas Shedrick of Connellsville, James Robert of Draketown and Elmer, of Ursina. As a young man he followed the shoemaker trade in Scottdale, and lived in many different places in Fayette and Somerset counties. Twenty years ago he located in Ursina. The last seven years of his life his son, Elmer, made his home with him and gave him devoted care and attention. At the time of his death his son, Robert, who was his guardian, was sick in the Frantz Hospital, recovering from an operation. Surviving other than thethree sons are 48 grandchildren and 119 great grandchildren and 9 great great grandchildren. The body laid in state in Charles Humbert's Funeral Home in Confluence and remained there until Saturday noon, when it was removed to the Mt. Olive Brethren Church, near Connellsville, where services were conducted by Rev. J. Arnold Berg, Somerfield pastor of the Church of God, assisted by Rev. Marian Smith, pastor of the Church of the Nazarine. He was buried in the church cemetery by the side of his wife. The pall bearers were World War veterans--Joseph Critchfield, Fred Hartman, Homer Rush, Harry Campbell, Ed McClintock and B. Speicher. He was buried in a blue serge suit on which were the G. A. R. buttons taken from his old and tattered soldiersuit that he so proudly wore so many times. He wore his G. A. R. badge pinned on his chest which had seen many years of service when he was a member of the Scottdale and later Ursina G.A.R. Post, until it was disbanded some years ago. He was a life-long member of the Church of God. There are two surviving Civil War veterans in Somerset County, Robert E. Ross of Addison, who will be 91 years old on July 23, and William H. Bender of Berlin, aged 92.



chael, has also authored a novel entitled **DEATH VISITS** CANAAN. This book is based on his research after finding a gravestone in Canaan Valley which is the oldest dated object known to exist. He tells the story of a nineyear-old boy, whose gravestone this was, and which could have been the story of any one of thousands of young boys from this time in 1880.




